The novel follows the life of Huyền, a young woman born into Hà Nội's upper-class, whose innocent interest in her mother's pregnancy is kept at arm's length: 'You'll find out when you get married', so they say. Lacking sexual education from her family, Huyền turns to her peers for answers, opening up a world of childish whispers about physical pleasure.

As polite society demands Huyền to remain virtuous, she enters into adulthood with both the will to know and the will to suppress a young woman's burning physical desires. The torments of her sexual frustration spiral Huyền into a life of debauchery, one she might not ever want to turn back from.

Vũ Trọng Phụng (1912-1939) is widely regarded as one of the most influential figures of 20th century Vietnamese literature. Despite his short lifespan, Phụng left behind an astonishing body of works across genres, many of which are considered masterpieces. Accused of 'cultural damage' due to the sexual content in his writings, he faced legal action, and his works were banned in the north of Vietnam, then nationally until the late 1980s.



Đinh Ngọc Mai (ren) is a non-binary writer of both academic and creative texts. Their research focuses on queer theory and queer Vietnamese and Asian American literature, tapping into the intellectual excitement and critical empathy that a queer Asian diaspora can enable and liberate.

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
